<b>mortal</b>	Have to die and cannot live for ever.	<b>vengeance</b>	Act of killing, injuring, or harming someone because they have harmed you.
<b>immortal</b>	Will live or last for ever and never die or be destroyed.	<b>wither</b>	Becoming very weak.
<b>heroic</b>	Someone who is admired for extreme bravery.	<b>vain</b>	Showing extreme pride in own beauty, intelligence, or other good qualities.
<b>monstrous</b>	Huge, powerful or ugly and frightening.	<b>immoral</b>	Behaviour is believed by most to be wrong or bad.
<b>deceitful</b>	Aiming to make people believe something which is not true.	<b>moral</b>	Behaviour is believed by most to be good and right.
<b>over-reacher</b>	A person who tries to reach something which is beyond their power.	<b>stable</b>	Not likely to change or come to an end suddenly.
<b>protagonist</b>	One of the main people in a play or novel.	<b>unstable</b>	Likely to change suddenly, especially if this creates difficulty or danger.
<b>antagonist</b>	Opponent or enemy.	<b>captivity</b>	The state of being kept imprisoned or trapped.
<b>disobedient</b>	Do not do what someone in authority tells you to do.	<b>courageous</b>	Doing something difficult or dangerous, even though you may be afraid.
<b>obedient</b>	Do what someone in authority tells you to do.	<b>oppress</b>	To prevent a group of people from having the same opportunities, freedom, and benefits as others.
<b>tyrannical</b>	Someone who treats the people they rule over in a cruel and unfair way.	<b>emancipate</b>	To free someone from unpleasant or unfair social, political, or legal restrictions.
<b>misogyny</b>	Strong dislike or hatred of women.	<b>naive</b>	To lack experience and so expect things to be easy or people to be honest or kind.
<b>vengeance</b>	Act of killing, injuring, or harming someone because they have harmed you.	<b>enchanted</b>	Feeling great delight or pleasure, almost like being under a spell.
<b>avaricious</b>	Very greedy for money or possessions.	<b>superficial</b>	To have little understanding of anything serious or important.
<b>objectify</b>	To treat someone as though they are a lifeless object.	<b>duplicitous</b>	Someone who deceitful, lies and are two faced.
<b>exploit</b>	To treat someone unfairly by using their work or ideas and giving very little in return.	<b>cunning</b>	Having the ability to achieve things in a clever way, often by deceiving other people.
<b>manipulate</b>	To skilfully force or persuade people to do what they want.	<b>foolish</b>	Something which is not sensible and shows a lack of good judgment.
<b>solitary</b>	To spend a lot of time alone.	<b>barbaric</b>	To behave in an extremely cruel or uncivilised way.
<b>annihilation</b>	Total destruction.
